It has a well equipped computer centre with internet facility.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution's vision and mission is to impart value – based education and develop individual students for promotion and sustenance initiatives so as to make them better citizens of tomorrow. The college is a Government institution affiliated to the Manipur University. As an affiliated college it has limited academic flexibility. It conducts 19 conventional Undergraduate Degree programmes in the disciplines of Arts and Science with General and Honours Courses 3 Add on Courses, 3 B. Voc. Courses and 2 diploma Courses. The college follows Semester System of Examinations and also offers number of elect options. Being an affiliated college, it follows University Curriculum. Compulsory courses are introduced in Environmental Studies and Computer Skills. Seminars/Workshop/Conferences are organized from time to time. ICT is used in pedagogy. Some faculty members are in Board of Studies in the University. The college established Community College under the assistance of University Grants Commission from the academic year 2014-15 and introduced B.Voc. Courses from the year 2018-19 to impart Vocational Subjects. The infrastructure and facilities available in the college for each courses are inspected by the University at the time of introduction of new programmes. The college authority in consultation with respective faculty members made provision to frame Teaching plans and Schedules for different programmes after careful study. Suggestion from Parents, Alumni Association are taken regularly to improve the curriculum which is again informed to the University for improvement. Employability is the major consideration for selecting courses.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college has positively adapted to the changing scenario in the area of Higher Education in the country. Today the college has made a great progress in Teaching, Learning and Evaluation. The college follows University guidelines for admission and reservation policy in accordance to state Government reservation policy. Admission process is transparent and strictly based on merit. The college renders free education to meritorious as well as sports students to encourage their talent and competitive works. Since most of the students are from rural areas, they could not afford for coaching classes to back up their weak subjects. In view of this, the college renders special remedial coaching programmes and tutorials for weak and needy students every year. The college also conducts special classes for slow learners. ICT is used in pedagogy. Freeships and Scholarships are availed to the needy and deserving students. As an affiliated college, it follows University Academic calendar. The college has good academic planning and organization. Medium of instruction is in English, and Manipuri. Lecture methods are predominantly used while teaching. ICT facilities are also used in teaching and learning processes, Computer assisted teaching and learning resources are available in the Library and Departments. Majority of teaching faculties are M.Phil and Ph.D. and most of the faculties are undergoing Research. Faculties are involved in Research and Publications. Good number of teachers attended Seminars/ Workshops/ Conferences/ Refresher Courses/ Orientation Courses/ Short Term Courses. Evaluation of students progress is done as per University norms and also conducted regular assessment of students. Moreover, college monitored progress of the students through Semester Examinations, Class tests and Terminal Examinations. Grievances regarding evaluation of students progress is redressed by a mechanism adopted by the Students Grievance Redressal Cell. The examination results are indicative of Course outcome and Programme outcome and how students are benefitted from college education despite most of them are from rural and weaker sections of the society. Students have great aptitude for cultural activities and won many award and prizes in extra and co-curricular activities in the college and Inter-college festivals.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college boasts of having 21 faculty members having Ph.D. degree and 22 Faculty members having M.Phil. Degrees. The faculty members are encouraged to do further research and publish research articles and books. About 10 teachers are pursuing Ph. D. Programme. Apart from this many faculties have authored articles in various academic journals, magazines and books which are very useful to the student community. Annual College Magazines are published regularly. The college constituted a Research and Development Committee which monitors the research activities of the faculties. Faculties get research funding from the University Grants Commission, SERB and DST. International and National research publications are available in the library. E-Library facility and internet facilities are also available in the library as well as Departmental Libraries. The college constituted Library Committee to monitor and look after all the activities of the library. Ph.D. Degree holders publicized their expertise to promote consultancy services to local farmers, agricultural scientists etc. Industry-Institute relationship has been established for vocationalisation and skill development. The college has excellent record of performing community and social service. N.S.S., N.C.C., UBA and Junior Red Cross Society provide big opportunities to the students to serve the society. Good number of programmes are organized by N.S.S. Unit I,II & III as main outreach programmes. In the last five years, the N.S.S. adopted the Okram Village, Thoubal District and did social work in collaboration with the local club. It is an annual feature of the college to organize Blood Donation Camps by involving N.S.S. Unit I,II & III, N.C.C. and Junior Red Cross. Many of the cadets have participated in the prestigious Republic Day Parade held in Delhi and Imphal. The students of the college have been taking part in Inter-College, Inter-University, National and International competitions.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has 9.3 acre campus with good infrastructure. It is situated at Asian Highway No.102 and National Highway 39. It is well connected to all parts of Manipur by National Highway and State High ways. The college has adequate space and class rooms. It has outer and Indoor sports facilities. Physical Fitness Centre & Gymnasium and canteen available in the campus. The college has 80 bedded Girls' Hostel, constructed under the UGC sponsored schemes, and 25 bedded Sports hostel. College campus is Eco- friendly and healthy environment. College campus is well maintained and maintenance budget is available. Recreational Facilities, Vehicle Parks, Drinking Water Facilities, Solid waste management facilities are also available in the campus. The college has a Library with about 14500 books, 14 Journals and 10 periodicals. Moreover, e-Library facilities are available in the library. Library Automation is initiated by using SOUL 2.0 software. Free internet facility is providing in the library. Library Advisory Committee has been constituted to look after and monitor library activities. The college has a computer centre with well configured computers. In addition to this Library, all the Department have their own computer systems with internet Wi-Fi facilities. Computer literacy programmes are organized regularly for Non-Teaching Staffs and students.

College campus is under CCTV surveillance for 24 hours. 15 class rooms are ICT enabled with smart boards and projectors. Language Lab. Is well equipped with Linguaphone and other accessories. Biotech Hub is well equipped with sophisticated instruments, glass wares. Science Laboratories and Food Processing Laboratory are well equipped with small, Micro and medium size equipment and tools. Reprography facility is provided in the library for easy copy and reproduction of old and rare scripts available in the library.

Student Support and Progression

The college has students support and mentoring system. It follows reservation policy in admission as per reservation policy of the state Government. There is a Career Guidance and Counselling Cell to guide students before and after admission in Under Graduate courses. Remedial Classes are conducted for weak students. The college has a long history of distinguished Alumni Association. Alumni Association organised special programmes for guidance and assistance to needy students. College prospectus is published every year before the new admission. Hostel facility provided in the college is very helpful to students from far remotes place of the state. Sports infrastructure and Fitness centre provides great opportunity to sports talented students of the college and encourage them in shaping their future. All facilities in the Fitness Centre and sports infrastructure are opened 24 hours to the students and staffs. The Examination results are encouraging and pass percentage is good. Students drop out rate is fairly less and there is a mechanism to monitor student progression to higher education and employment. Progression from Under Graduate to Post Graduate and placement is satisfactory. A good number of students participated in sports at Inter- College Tournament, inter university and Youth Festivals annually. Moreover, cultural activities are organized and promoted through participation in the collegiate and youth festivals. Students are actively involved in community works under the guidance of NSS, NCC and UBA programme officers. The college has produced many International and National players. Some of them are L. Sarita Chanu – Boxing, Th. Kritina Devi- Football, W. Maleshwari Devi-archery, K. Dorita Chanu – Karate. There are sports facilities available in the college and students are encouraged to make use of the sports facilities provided. Sports students are assisted to continue their education by giving fee concession and relaxing percentage of attendance.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has its own policies and strategies in the area of management to promote efficiency and effectiveness in all academic activities. The syllabi are taught in time. Tests and examinations are conducted according to the academic calendar. The college Governing Body and the office provide necessary support in all respects. Principal and Academic committees are key functionaries in institutional governance. The college prepared a perspective master plan and various internal committees are formed for good governance. The college has decentralized and collaborative structures in decision making. Principal acts as nodal person for strategy development, interacting with management, staff and stakeholders. Faculty members of the college submit annual self-assessment report to the principal. The college encourages active participation of faculty members in administrative work and encouraged for professional development. Formal grievance redressal mechanism for faculty and staffs constituted. College accounts are properly maintained and audited regularly. Main financial resources of the college are from fees collected from students and funds allocated by the State Government and UGC and others. The college is targeting to open self-finance courses. College staffs can avail of festival Bonus and advances from the College fund. The college constituted Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). It lays down academic time table and schedules to be followed. IQAC monitors teaching and learning processes.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Tremendous changes was evident in the college by introducing various schemes. Several

progressive methods have been adopted to promote creativity and innovations. In addition to regular conventional academic courses, several job oriented and vocational in nature are introduced with the changing time and scenario. Every year college conducted tree plantation drive in connection with Ban mohan shop observance. It maintained botanical garden and water harvesting system. The college has taken special

concerned for disadvantaged groups, rural, tribal and poor students. The college has set up rain water harvesting pond in the college campus to conserve water. It has a plan to set up water purification plant in the campus. Admission process and library works are fully computerized. Students pursue in different extension activities. The college monitors students' activities through mentors in different activities. Eco Club, Research and Development Cell, Women's Study centre, Cultural Study Centre etc. are established in the college. Sanitary vending machine is installed at the college for women's health and hygiene. Health awareness programmes are also organized by the students through N.S.S. and N.C.C. The career Guidance Counselling Cell offers personal counselling and even help them to join the right concerns. All the activities in the college help students to develop their wholesome personalities in a balanced way.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary learning is a method that covers an idea, topic, or text by integrating multiple knowledge domains. It is a very powerful method of teaching that crosses the boundaries of a discipline or curriculum in order to enhance the scope and depth of learning. Faculties from different disciplines are working together, each drawing on their disciplinary knowledge. Interdisciplinary education is considered best when it comes to boosting the learning outcomes and making the whole understanding process interesting and enthusiastic for the students. Interdisciplinary teaching allows students to think critically, identify their own prejudices, accept the unknown and respect

ethical quandaries with enabling the students to understand different insights and perceptions of different disciplines, also synthesizes information surrounding a topic and, ultimately, offers a more complete understanding of an issue. In our college faculties from both Arts and Science are teaching together in certain subjects like North East Regional Studies, Environmental Studies etc. to enhance the depth of learning of the students.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a virtual/digital storehouse that contains the information of the credits earned by individual students throughout their learning journey. It will enable students to open their accounts and give multiple options for entering and leaving colleges or universities. There will be "multiple exits" & "multiple entries" points during the higher education tenure & credits will be transferred through the ABC seamlessly. ABC can be considered as an authentic reference to check the credit record of any student at any given point in time. Thus, the concept of ABC is fuel to boost the efficiency of faculty and help students embrace a multi-disciplinary educational approach. The idea is to make students "skillful professionals" and help their overall growth. • The Academic Bank will be accountable for opening, closing, and validating the academic accounts of students. It will carry out tasks such as credit accumulation, credit verification, credit transfer/redemption of students. The courses include online and distance mode courses offered by the government and institutes. The validity of these academic credits earned by students will be up to seven years and students can redeem these credits. The credits can be redeemed and students can seek admission directly in the second year at any university. The validity will be up to seven years, hence, students will have to rejoin within seven years. ABC increases the student's freedom in choosing their courses and academics. It enables the student to drop out in any year and then exchange the credits earned so far with a certificate/diploma if they are eligible. Students can redeem the credits and rejoin the same or any other institute in the future and continue their education. The institutes cannot keep the students in the courses against their will to earn money. • Under the guidelines of New Education Policy (NEP), we are planning to create an ABC in

aligned with the curricular framework of Manipur University.

3. Skill development:

Skill Development recognizes soft skills such as communication, cooperation, teamwork, leadership, empathy and resilience, as 'life skills'. This different approach is designed to help students develop academic expertise with vital leadership skills that can help them in their career path. Waikhom Mani Girls' College has Add on Courses/ Career Oriented Courses in addition to general courses for making students an academic expertise during their course of study. Moreover, we had added B.Voc. and Diploma courses since 2018 to give life skill courses to students. The mission of the skill development courses are to create opportunities and scope for talent development for the youths by offering them specific skill courses. To boost the hidden skill of students and to motivate them leading to aright path in future. To identify the new areas of interest of the students in life skill education.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The National Education Policy seeks to instil in students a rootedness and pride in India, and its "rich, diverse, ancient and modern culture and knowledge systems and traditions". The vision of the policy is to instil among the learners a deep-rooted pride in being Indian, not only in thought, but also in spirit, intellect, and deeds, as well as to develop knowledge, skills, values, and dispositions that support responsible commitment to human rights, sustainable development and living, and global well-being, thereby reflecting a truly global citizen. World-class institutions of ancient India such as Taksha-shila, Nalanda, Vikramshila, Vallabhi set the highest standards of multidisciplinary teaching and research and hosted scholars and students from across the world, it stresses. Indian culture and philosophy have had a strong influence on the world. 1. As long as online learning offers the same quality as traditional education does, it will continue to be embraced by learners. ?n an online environment asynchronously, which means the information can be accessed when it is most convenient for the learner. This is a huge advantage for people who want to participate remotely in programs they wouldn't be able to attend otherwise. Distance/online learning is seamlessly cost and time-saving and therefore allows participants to combine work, family, and studies. The learning

experience is technologically enhanced, and students with disabilities now have endless accessible learning options. Elearning also reduces the costs of training by removing costly transportation, physical location costs and other amenities that traditional education tends to offer. Waikhom Mani Girls' College also accessed the LMS Moodle learning platform for Online learning. Students are enjoyed with the online learning.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

In the traditional system of education, the teachers and students spend a lot of time trying to learn the syllabus of every subject. The main aim of the course and curriculum has been to score good marks in the examination. The students weren't skilled or knowledgeable enough by the end of the semester due to this method. Further, this increased the problem of unemployment in the country as many students were not skilled enough to match the requirements of candidates in the companies. The gap between industry requirements and curriculum gave rise to unemployable students. Outcome-based education is a system where all the parts and aspects of education are focused on the outcomes of the course. The students take up courses with a certain goal of developing skills or gaining knowledge and they have to complete the goal by end of the course. There is no specific style or time limit of learning. The student can learn as per their choice. The faculty members, moderators, and instructors guide the students based on the target outcomes. Benefits of OBE: ? Brings clarity among the teachers and students? Every student has the flexibility and freedom of learning in their ways. ? There is more than one method of learning? Reduces comparison among the students as everyone has a different target ? Completely involves students taking responsibility for their goals? The outcome based education system also referred to as standard based education, has proven to be a success in helping institutions measure their learning outcomes and at the same time enabling students to develop new skills that prepare them to stand out with their global counterparts.

6. Distance education/online education:

Distance education is an educational mode supplementary, complementary and alternative to conventional/traditional system of education, depending on the situation it is practised. Today it has evolved into an independent system of education,

thanks to the growth of communication technologies and the cognitive sciences which are flexible enough to use the technologies for pedagogic purposes. It is an educational innovation to meet the ever increasing and diversified educational needs and demands of the society which are sequel to changing social, economic, and other conditions on one hand and technological developments on the other. Communication technology has widened the scope of educational technology and enhanced the efficiency of educational communication coupled with accuracy and speed of feedback. As a result of this, it has become possible to offer a variety of educational programmes to different sections or groups of people through various media of communication. Alternatively, we can even offer the same in one medium only or in each of the available media, or through a media mix to a particular target group or to different groups.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The college has campus area of 9.33 acres. College has Arts Block, Science Block and General Class Rooms. Besides it has Skill Section i.e. B.Voc. Courses and Community College Block. The college has 16 ICT based Smart Class rooms with fully equipped.

Class room facilities:

Classrooms are very important for holistic development of a students' career. Classrooms in our college have well equipped with comfortable environment. The total number of classrooms in the college is 21 and 16 are ICT enabled classrooms. The classrooms have sufficient space, well-ventilated. Some of the Classrooms are disable friendly. Classrooms are provided with platforms for attaining sufficient height for writing on the board and to have good reach towards students. Desks and Benches with sufficient space for sitting of two students comfortably. Classrooms are provided white board marker and white boards instead of chalk and black boards to avoid chalk dust.

Details of laboratories:

College has 10 laboratories, one language Lab., One research Lab. Under Institutional Biotech Hub and One Food Processing Laboratory. College is also having common instrumentation facility in Institutional Biotech Hub. Fire extinguishers and other safety aid are kept at easily accessible points. All science laboratories are set up with well equipped and spacious to avoid congestion during practical classes. All laboratories are designed as per the need of the subject and to make the working more effectively.

Physics laboratory have two rooms, One is open excess with small and medium instruments and Another is used as dark room for experiments in the absence of light. Chemistry laboratory has two separate rooms i.e. Physical Chemistry lab. With sophisticated instruments and Inorganic and Organic Lab. with small, micro and medium instruments along with glassware. Distillation plant set up in the chemistry laboratory for producing distilled water. Botany and Zoology laboratories are set up with high resolution microscopes, plant and animal specimens, Laminar Air flow, Simple and Compound Microscopes etc. Geology Laboratory has sharp edge tools, microscopes and other small tools. More than 100 rock samples collected and displayed in the laboratory for analysis and hands on training.

In Statistics laboratory, computers are loaded with all the required softwares and designed with inclined monitors so as to have a convenient and effective use. Physics laboratory have dark room for the experiments with special requirements.

Language lab is equipped with all the required softwares and audio visual aid. Sufficient number of headphones and Mikes are present in the college which helps in the online teaching process.

Power back up System:

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College has two 5KVA silent power generator sets and One 20 KVA silent Generator set. Moreover, we have installed 3 KVA Solar power plant to back up power shortage.

The college has 300 capacity Seminar Hall, 80 capacity Conference hall, Library with more than 14000 books with 50 sitting capacity, Indoor Hall of 500 sitting capacity, well equipped fitness centre, Rain water harvesting pond, College canteen, Guest House, Girls' Common room with adequate furniture, Women's Hostel with 80 capacity, Sports Hostel with 25 capacity.

The college has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor). The College has a Cultural Study Centre established since 2017 as recommended by the NAAC Peer Team visited during 2016. Separate room is available for keeping all the musical instruments and the stage material used for the cultural activities. Musical instruments, Harmonium, Synthesizer, Tabla-Dagga, Octopad ,Dolki are available.

Fitness Centre and Gymnasium facility:

Fitness centre and Gymnasium facility is available in the college campus. Weight lifting, Cycle, Gym, vibrator, Trade Mill, Dumb Bell, Stretcher, Ball are available in the Fitness centre. Gymnasium is having all high-grade instruments for total body workout such as Abdominal Bench, bar bell, bench press, cable cross over pully, Dumbbells Pairs with different weights, Motorized Treadmill, Pull-up and Push up Bar, Rowing Machine, Smith Machine etc. Gym set up in the Fitness Centre is a big one. Three persons can play with the Gym at a time. There is a separate changing room attached. At a time the Fitness centre and the Gymnasium 30 individuals. Fitness centre is taking care by the sports teacher while assessing to the students and staffs of the college. Instructions and guidelines are provided to the students and staffs before starting playing. Fitness centre is eco-friendly and well ventilated. Teaching and Non-Teaching staffs of the college regularly visited at the Fitness centre in the morning and students in the afternoon.

Sport facility:

Colleges has indoor and Outdoor facilities for games like Basketball court and handball Court are available

in the college campus. Basketball court is developed in international standard size i.e. 15.2×28.7 square meter area. Sufficient number of sport material like Boxing bout, football, basketball, badminton, table tennis rackets, fitness equipment, and issued to the students as per the requirement. The college developed Football ground in the adjoining village, Thoubal Okram, just 50 meters from the college campus. Sports equipment issuing register is maintained. Available sports infrastructure is optimally used for physical education lectures and practice, inter class and Inter College competitions by students and staff members.

Games and sports infrastructure available in the college are optimally used for practice by the students and Physical Education Teacher for intercollege competitions and inter University competitions. Indoor game materials are issued to students during their off class time and after the class hour.

The college has conducted Yoga classes as special programme for teachers and students. Yoga mats are procured for the Yoga classes.

Library has created Institutional Repository and made open access to all staffs and students. In this IR faculty publications, syllabus, old question papers, free e-books, e-content prepared by faculty members, reports of the major and minor research works conducted, books and chapters published etc. are made available.

Students and Staff members of the college are permitted to borrow 2 and 3 books at a time respectively. Duration of borrowing is 7 days and after seven days borrower should renew for further borrowing of the same.

Inflibnet N-List is available under Institutional Repository (IR) and access is made available online on college website. In the IR free e-books, e-journals are available. Readers can access this IR through college website.

Reprography facility is made available in the library. Photocopying of books, magazines, Journals etc. are done in the lowest rate to facilitate students and faculty members of the college. Library is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on every working days.

National and Local daily Newspapers and periodical publications are displayed in the board for reading. Two national newspapers and three Local newspapers are subscribed. Monthly academic bulletins, health bulletins, Sports magazines, Scientific magazines are also subscribed.

Laboratories Maintenance:

Maintenance of Laboratory Assistants and Attendants under the supervision of a faculty member. Laboratory equipment are installed with the help of technicians deputed by the manufacturing companies. Regular servicing and maintenance is carried out for the instruments. Calibration of instruments is done if necessary.

Utilization:

Students are grouped into batches so as to give hands-on training to all the students. Practical are conducted before and after the theory classes by following the common routine.

Library Maintenance:

Maintenance of software used in the Library is done at least once in a year. Bookshelves, reading tables and chairs are regularly checked. Library is well ventilated with plenty of windows and ventilators. Furniture and fixtures are repaired as per the requirement. Library is semi- automated. Open access facility is given to all students to the books, journals, magazines and periodicals so as to have effective referencing and exploring of new books related to subjects. Library staffs are taking utmost care on issue, receive and lending of books. Newspapers and newly arrived books, journals, magazines are exhibited on board.

Utilization:

Library is kept open during office hour for the benefit of students and faculty members. Librarian, Bookman and other subordinate staffs are utilized for maximum utilization of the library. Separate computer is provided to student for book search through N-List. N-List login ID and Password are created for students and faculty members to enable them to access N-List. Notice Board is used to notify the new arrival of Books, Journals and Magazines.

Computers Maintenance:

Maintenance of Computer sets are dome by System Manager and Faculty member. Regular up-gradation is carried out for hardware and software.

Utilization:

Computers available in Administrative Office, Library and Departments are fully utilized for different purposes. Computers in Administrative Block, Library are used for e-office purposes and Library Automation using SOUL 2.0 Software respectively. Computers are connected through LAN and with a high speed internet facility. Computers are provided with upgraded .

Sports facility Maintenance:

Regular maintenance is carried out for Physical Fitness Centre, gymnasium, sports equipment.

Utilization:

Sport material is issued to students during the recess time and during the practice hour for participating in

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Inter College Sports meet etc.

Student bodies organised many activities like Sports meet, Debate, Quiz programme, Blood donation camp, Social service, Song competition, and summer internship programmes etc. Our students took part leading role during COVID period. They distributed Food items to poor and needy peoples of far remote places of Manipur, Prepared Hand Sanitizer in the College Laboratory and distributed to COVID Worriers and front line workers.

Student representatives are taking place active role in Cells and Committees like Anti Ragging Committee, Grievance redressal Committee, Management Committee etc. The student representatives participate in committee meetings, deliberations and decision-making process. 5.4 Alumni Engagement

College has registered Alumni Association. Alumni association took leading role while conducting remedial classes for the weak students. They have great contribution in infrastructural development of the college. Alumni members organised many training programmes for physical health and safety, self-protection, Skill development, leadership training, yoga and meditation etc. Alumni members also organised tree plantation programme in collaboration with NSS and NCC volunteers of the college. They also took major role in implementing Swatchta Bharat Mission and Swatchta Pakhawada.

Alumni Association aims at enhancing employability and entrepreneurial skills amongst youth by collaborating with the college for various events so as to bridge the gap between academia and industry. Every year, Alumni Association organises Awareness programmes on career option after graduation, IEC programmes, awareness on sanitary health of women, cultural exchange among the groups of different communities etc. Moreover, Alumni Association awarded two/three students per year for their outstanding performance in University Examinations.

They have contributed in the infrastructure development of the college. Minor renovation works like repairing of Toilets, campus beautification, tree plantation, cleaning of rain water harvesting pond etc. are carried out with a minimum contribution. NCC cadets and NSS volunteers of the college extended help to Alumni Association while executing such activities.

Perspective Plans: Constant plans are formulated and executed for the achievement of Developing appropriate skills of livelihood and instilling scientific temper in the students. For instance, cells like Career and Placement cell organizes seminars, workshops, placement drives, where students are made aware about the opportunities available to them right after their college. The students are introduced to new different skill development programmes provided by the Government and Non-Government agencies. 6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Response:

The college follows the participative management approach in managing the institution. It aims at the concept of innovativeness in management of academic and administrative matters. The practice of decentralized participative management reflects the mechanism of policy making, planning and administration and office management. The Principal who is the academic and administrative head of the College supervises all activities of the College and ensures maintenance of academic discipline, overall ambience of the institution. She is assisted by the College Council which consists of all Head of the Department. Decentralization of administration ensures to have free and independent thinking among faculty. A decentralized functioning mechanism empowers the departments to function with a greater flexibility and at the same time they share the responsibilities. The college enhances the quality and quantity through the following committees: Academic Committee, College Development Committee, IQAC, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Disciplinary Committee, College Construction Committee, NSS, NCC. The college administration plays an integral part in fulfilling the policies programmes and initiatives that are associated with the vision and mission of the college. All the Heads of Departments are responsible for administration and maintenance of their respective Departments in accordance with the vision and mission of the college. Administerial staffs and Non-teaching staffs of the college also plays crucial role in day-to-day management works to meet and accomplish operational and strategic objectives. Faculty members and other technical staffs in different departments maintain good relationship with students and community. They always perform their duties for maintaining good academic atmosphere in the college by aligning with the vision and mission of the college. At the beginning of every academic year the IQAC in consultation with Heads of different departments of the college prepare prospective plan for the academic session on the basis of admitted student strength.

Admission committee and Examination Committee are formed every year in order to smoothly conduct admission procedure and Examinations in the college. Senior faculty members along with administrative staff members are included in the committee. Regular meetings are held for proper coordination ,sharing of information and timely execution of necessary tasks. The college displayed information to the students about career options and conduct the counselling session if required.

The mentor system is in implementation at the college level for all the students. Each faculty member is assigned 25 students for mentoring. These mentors interact with the students and parents and address all their academic and personal needs for an overall development. In order to have continuous improvement in

the teaching learning process, feedback is collected at different time intervals during the semester from students through a group interaction and online feedback form. The feedback is communicated to the faculty concerned through HoD for improvements as desired. Principal conducts meetings with HoD's once in a week to discuss various academic/cocurricular/extracurricular activities. Monthly department meetings are held in all departments where internal issues are discussed.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Response:

The Institutional Biotech Hub established at Waikhom Mani Girls' College is a common facilitation centre of research based and experiential learning. It provides basic laboratory based training to the budding science students. The Hub facilitates practical training and research activities not only for the students, researchers and faculties of the college but also of other neighbouring institutions. Over the years, the Hub has become an integral part of the college and today students have been able to get practical exposure of PCR, Spectrophotometer and other such tools together with the theoretical knowledge. Various student research projects could also be implemented using hub infrastructure. This has made biology learning more interesting and attractive. The infrastructure available in the HUB is open access to all the teachers and students. This resulted in an unprecedented growth in fostering research culture among the teachers and students. All the practical oriented subjects are invited to work in the Hub to roll out experiential learning and hands on training programmes. This has helped the college in introducing student- centric, research -based teaching pedagogies. One of the distinctive features was the introduction of research projects at under-graduate levels, right from the first year and to continue them till their final years of UG degree programs. This programme has taken the institute to the next level, and the college has proposed themebased research activities in crosscutting areas. This exemplifies the perspective plan and its effective execution for creation of a vibrant, experiential, research-based learning centre in the college. The BT Hub conducted many workshop, seminar and awareness programme for the students and faculty member. The Biotech hub carry out research work which may have many industrial applications and currently an emerging area of research and have published 7 papers in the last five years.

Entrepreneuship training program on Aromatic oil extraction as well as development of Mini herbal garden at the college campus of *Cymbopogon citratus* for green tea production has been organised twice in collaboration with MSME Technology Centre Imphal. Entrepreneurship training program on mushroom cultivation as well as preparation methods of spawns is frequently organized by Biotech-hub for accrued benefits and income/employment generation of young aspiring youths. We also extend the said programs to different districts of the state. Mushroom production and vermicomposting units have started generating income to bitech-hub.

Different activities such as hands on training, workshops and outreach programs are further planned to organise for the academic as well as socio-economic development of the region. We also target to bio-

prospect certain indigenous and minor vegetables crops to secure food for the future. Hence, we have planned to evaluate physic-chemical and nutritional properties of these minor crops. We will be trying to tie up with Institute Of Bio resource & Sustainable Development Imphal for further Reseach and Development and other activity programs and further extend our supports in the field of academic and research to far more institution.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

Welfare Schemes for Teaching and non-Teaching Staff: The institution believes in providing a friendly, supportive and secure atmosphere to the staff, a comfortable environment for working, along with encouragement for progressing personally and professionally. In this regard, many welfare measures have been put in place for teaching as well as nonteaching staff:

Encouragement & Motivation: The College encourages & motivates Teaching Staffs for undergoing Orientation / Refresher / Short Term Courses/ Ph.D. Financial support is provided to attend workshops, seminars and conferences. Duty leave is granted for any academic purposes. Non-Teaching staff are encouraged to participate in Office Procedure Courses and Accounts Training related to Administration work and duty leaves are sanctioned to the staff for this purpose.

Research Projects: The College always encourages Teaching Staff to undertake Research Projects under different institutions like UGC, DST/ DBT etc. and provides them special facility to carry out their project work.

Encouragement faculty for doing part time Ph.D: All faculty members in this category are given on duty when they go for consultation with their guides and for attending research methodology course organised by the concerned universities. They also sent on duty for appearing their examinations as well.

Facilities: The College provides infrastructure facilities viz. Laptops, Desktops, Printers, Scanners & LCDs to all the departments for smooth functioning of day-to-day academic activities and for personal research of the Faculty members.

General Welfare Schemes for teaching and Non-Teaching Staff: Provident Funds: General Provident Fund (GPF) and National Pension Scheme (NPS) are the Retirement benefit Scheme provided to all the employees.

The college follows the Performance Appraisal System laid down by the UGC and Manipur State Government in the Form of Performance based appraisal system the Minimum norms of Selection Committee, Selection Procedure as well as API Score Requirements for the Different cadres.

Confidential Report of Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff is prepared by Principal of the College every year. A very systematic and effective Performance Appraisal System of the College is in place for all Teaching and Non-teaching Staff Members. Through these

appraisals the College encourages professional growth and development. The Process is designed to explore the individual professional skills and progress of employees and their

participation in Academic, Research, Curricular and Co-curricular activities which in turn lead to the overall development of the Institute. Performance Appraisal System is implemented for both teaching and non-teaching staff. The Appraisal System for performance review is conducted by the Appraisal Committee and Chairperson of IQAC is head of the Committee. The Committee checks and reviews documents and academic achievements. The Principal who adds his remarks on the document and forwards them to the State Government.

Non-teaching staff appointment and promotion

Non-teaching staff appointments:

On the basis of vacancy posts, advertisement for appointment of various posts of Non-teaching staffs are made. Vacancies are advertised in local newspapers and interviews are conducted. On the basis of written examinations and interview, candidates are given appointment. Qualified candidates are given appointment letters.

Non-teaching staff promotion.

Promotion of Non-Teaching staffs is prepared by the college on the basis of seniority, roster points, educational qualification etc. On the basis of interview, candidates are given promotion as per the rules of Manipur Government. College G,B, drafts a resolution for promotion given to the concerned staff and promotion letters are issued. Proposal for pay fixation is based on the latest ROP implemented under Manipur Government employees.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

College raises its funds through various resources such as fees from students like Admission fees, Examination fees, certificate fees, Lending of Multipurpose hall, Seminar hall, Class rooms (on Sundays and Holidays), cultivation at paddy land, college canteen etc.. In addition of above mentioned sources, college gets funds and research grants from funding agencies like UGC, DBT STAR, DST,. College also gets lum sum grants from the state Government. College has different committees for functioning properly. Some of the committees are College Development Committee, Infrastructure Committee, Purchase Committee, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Research Committee, Management Committee etc. These committees chalk out annual work plan for one academic year at the beginning of every year. Also each committee prepared estimated budget of expenditure annually and submitted to the college principal for approval. Purchase committee takes decision of purchase of equipment. Tender process is adopted for purchasing bulk quantity of equipment. Purchase Committee reviews quotations given by vendors thoroughly and final decision is taken on the basis of comparative analysis. Utilization of fund is targeting for the welfare and development of the students and staffs.

College authority estimated a separate budget for office management, Stationery items, and contingency expenses. Also, separate budget for sanitary health and hygiene is allocated for the welfare of girl students and female staffs.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

IQAC of the college is constantly working on the quality improvement. IQAC prepares a detailed academic plan for each academic year and ensures optimum utilization of the available infrastructure. IQAC has adopted quality improvement strategies in curriculum development, teaching-learning, examination and evaluation, research and development.

Practice I: MENTORING SYSTEM FOR STUDENTS

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IQAC has focused on the implementation of Mentoring system for students to minimize dropout rate, improve performance and reduce stress of the students through personal counselling.

IQAC initiates intense looking on the teaching learning process and progress of the students. It is difficult to give personal attention to students in classes. One solution, therefore, is a 'Mentor' who can form the bond with students. Mentoring is required for students to achieve emotional stability and to promote clarity in thinking and decision making for overall progress. Students undergo various problems of stress-personal, academic, physical, mental due to COVID-19 pandemic.

IQAC initiates following steps for mentoring students:

- Each teacher is assigned around 34-35 students.
- Due to covid-19 pandemic, physical meeting was impossible and hence online meetings are done to discuss, clarify and share various problems which may be personal or academic, etc.
- The mentors encourage the students to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Students' academic performance and other activities are recorded and keep in touch with the parents.
- The mentors counsel the students in need of emotional problems. Students' problems are resolved based on the mentors' report.
- Mentors take special care of weak students. Students' problems are discussed with the stakeholders.

IQAC closely monitored the success of the practice. Evidence of success includes better results in the University examinations with rank holders, improved attendance, less drop outs, increased participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities, better discipline on campus and respectful relationship between teachers and students. The students are more **re**laxed and have a healthy relationship with the staffs.

Practice II: e-governance

IQAC has focused on the implementation of e-governance in the areas like Administration, Accounts, Admission Process, Examination and Evaluation, student, Library and campus monitoring.

The College has implemented computerized admission system, Examination and documentation. This ensures sharing of data in time among the official staffs of the college. This simplifies the official procedures for admission, examination, administration and documentation. It also helps timely submission of information related to academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities conducted by various departments. Systematic documentation, class wise students record, transparency and accountability may be easily maintained under e-governance. All the computer systems are connected either by LAN or by internet connectivity. The college authority checks, verifies and guides the finance and accounts section from time to time. Admission process is fully online, wherein students' data is saved and used by the college for further correspondence in all official and administrative work.

The college has adopted Moodle LMS. Lecture notes, study material are shared with students through Moodle. The College has created Whatsapp groups for different purposes for staff and student through which official correspondence is done. Online examinations are conducted through various platforms available.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms and recorded the incremental improvement in various activities (For first cycle - Incremental improvements made for the preceding five years with regard to quality For second and subsequent cycles - Incremental improvements made for the preceding five years with regard to quality and post accreditation quality initiatives)

Response:

The institution regularly reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC as per norms and recorded the incremental improvement after the first cycle of accreditation in various activities.

The college has an active IQAC setup as per norms which includes Teacher representatives, a representative of Administrative Staff, one nominee each from Local Society, Students, Alumni. IQAC in coordination with other committees and administrative staffs seeks feedbacks regularly from all stakeholders. Based on the feedbacks collected an initiative is taken in the form of a communication to the students and teachers. Based on the analysis report of the feedback, remedy measures are taken up in

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teaching learning process, remedial coaching classes are conducted for weaker groups of students to lift up their weak areas. IQAC organises induction programs for new students every year at the beginning of the session to aware new students about the curriculum, vision and mission of the college, facilities available in the college, examination systems, conduct in the college campus, dress code etc.

IQAC implemented the recommendations of the peer team during their visit of first accreditation. As per the recommendation of the peer team IQAC in consultation with the principal and other committees established i) Cultural Study Centre, ii) Women's Study Centre and iii) provident fund for Non-teaching staffs. Moreover, IQAC organises Faculty Development Programmes for teaching faculties and training programmes for the Non-Teaching staffs regularly. IQAC also organises training sessions for defining learning outcomes and course outcomes and also for its attainment. Every year teaching faculties are expected to fill annual Performance Based Appraisal Form which IQAC scrutinizes for API verification.

Since the college does not have incinerator, biological wastes are also disposed though Municipality garbage collection van. A pucca dustbin is set up at the corner of tye college campus for collecting bulk garbages produced from the Hostel and Food Laboratory. The college utilized two sweepers for cleaning and collecting the plant wastes, garbages produced day-to-day. The two sweepers clean the college campus and classrooms before the class hour in the morning. Every Class rooms and Laboratories are provided Dust bins for collection of garbages. Hazardous chemicals produced from the Chemistry Laboratory and Biology laboratory are collected and disposed into an underground pit. Liquid wastes are collected through a drain and disposed into underground pit.

1. **Title of the Practice:** Continuous Evaluation of Students

1. Objectives:

The Main objectives of the practice are:

- 1. To check the progress of the students
- 2. To identify the weakness areas of students
- 3. To create competitive atmosphere among the students
- 4. To lift up weak students with other students

1. The Context:

The IQAC and the Academic Council of the college upon repeated discussion on the matter of improvement of academic quality of the college had adopted a mechanism for continuous evaluation of the students' performance. One mentor was allotted for every 30-40 students for guidance and checking the overall activities and performance of a student. Every mentor taking care of each student from the entry in the college up to the end of her course. Students' admission, internal assessment examinations, Term tests, End semester examinations, Extracurricular activities are guided and help by each mentor. Weakness areas found at any stage are reported to the concerned committees to take up necessary actions.

1. The Practice:

The college conducted Induction programme before the commencement of the normal classes. Just after the induction programme, mentors from the teaching faculties are selected and allotted 30 to 40 students from Arts and Science streams to each mentor. Each mentor taking care of students starting from the admission up to the end of the course. Admissions for different semesters, examinations, internal assessment, term tests and other extracurricular activities of the students are guided by the mentors. Grievances of students are also communicated through the respective mentors. Regular meeting are held between the mentors and students to discuss the grievances and progress of the students. Students may also arises complaints/ suggestions regarding the satisfaction of the curriculum delivery system adopted by the college and the lesson plans of the teachers. IQAC and other committees of the college strictly monitor the students' progress and ready to extend help to needy students wherever necessary. The College IQAC and Academic Council review the performance of the final year students and screened for awarding meritorious and Gold medal awards to the students.
